
The Southern California Genealogical Society, established in 1964, is a 501(c)(3) organization that is staffed solely by volunteers.

- Many different passenger lists and emigration lists.
- Surname indexes, etymologies and dictionaries to help understand the meaning of family names.
- Family histories and genealogies, some by German authors.
- Periodicals and publications from genealogical societies in Germany as well as German-American societies.
- Brockhaus Enzyclopädie, the German equivalent of the Encyclopaedia Britannica 1910 edition.
- Gazetteers, including Müllers and Meyers-Orts' 1912 gazetteer with 210,000 places, with several maps to help find those family origins.
- German histories and books on religions, customs, and other volumes to add flavor and better understand the lives of our German ancestors.
- Books and periodicals for Colonial Germans, Palatines, Hessian soldiers in the American Revolution, and Germans in Austria, Poland, Switzerland, Alsace-Lorraine, Russia, Czech Republic, and Hungary.
