We constantly review what civil records exist to help in our searches and what substitute records can be used to fill in the gaps. We explore the new and exciting ways we have to find those elusive ancestors of ours.

We not only have a growing collection of books in the Scots-Irish section but we also have large numbers of maps, periodicals, and a growing CD collection as well.

Some of the highlights of the collection include: Search for Missing Friends, several of MacLysaght's books, the 1659 Census of Ireland, the complete Casey collection, Famine Immigrants, Passenger Lists, Registry of Deeds, Gravestone Inscriptions, Plantations in Ulster, Monumental Inscriptions (Scotland), Scottish Settlers to North America, Scottish Parish Records and many, many more.
